A message from the South Australian Chair Craig Johansen



Welcome to 2021, hoping that the year has commenced with less confusion than 2020. We are 12 months on from the World's introduction to Covid19 and it is now a changed place, but play is still an important part of life for young and old, for our continued health and learning. Having seen the importance of this over the last 12 months I encourage you to look at the Play Australia website https://www.playaustralia.org.au/play-today-covid19 to see the importance of play through the pandemic.

It has been a great start to the year for Play Australia and the South Australian Branch. Play Australia released its Strategic Plan 2020-2025 last year. 1000 Play Streets arrived to the state in 2020 and a workshop was held in February 2021 to bring interested stakeholders together. The workshop allowed interested parties to hear the learnings from those that have activated streets here locally for play and be informed of the State Government's interest in supporting this initiative, more on this further in the newsletter.

Last year saw the continued development of new playspaces across the State and it is the committees desire to get out this year and have networking events at some of these spaces. It was great for us here in South Australia that the Children's Commissioner for South Australia, Helen Connelly was a special guest at the Play Australia AGM held late February. This is encouraging for us to have an advocate for play within the State Government. Our CEO and committee members have been in continued conversation with the commissioner over the last number of years, with particular note to the transition of year 7 to High School and the importance of play within the learning environment of High School.

South Australian Commissioner for Children and Young People

As South Australia's Commissioner for Children and Young People, Helen Connelly's mandate is to promote the rights, interests and wellbeing of all children and young people living in SA. She is one of the most prominent advocates of play in our state. Her recent report entitled "Press Play" shows that young people in SA are experiencing a number of fundamental barriers to play. The report provides three recommendations: 1) Master planners, transport and urban designers incorporate strategies to address barriers to play for 13-18-year olds. 2) Public and environmental health bodies work with local communities to raise awareness of the links between play and wellbeing 3) Local Councils engage young people to provide input on how to increase health and wellbeing outcomes through play.

It is clear that we need to know more about how to promote play opportunities for older children and with this front of mind The Commissioner, University of South Australia and Play Australia have come together to collaborate in a project looking at play at school for children aged 11 to 13 years, investigating how play in early adolescence changes as children transition from primary school to high school www.unisa.edu.au/play-in-early-adolescence. Helen's commitment to play is vital for changes in attitude, action, and policy within our state











1000 Playstreets - SA Network Workshop

On Thursday 18 February, the South Australia PlayStreets Network was launched at a workshop hosted by Campbelltown City Council. 8 local council's and 2 state government departments were represented. There were also University researchers and staff from Play Australia in attendance.

Inspiring presentations from 3 councils on their neighbourhood development work included.

Street Meets: Sarah Maddock, Place Leader – Urban Projects, City of Charles Sturt

Street Gatherings: Chris Martin, Acting Team Leader, Community Connections Team, City of Onkaparinga.

Street Play: Tracy Johnstone, Manager Community Services & Social Development, Campbelltown City Council.

It was clear from the presentations that we have a core network who understand the benefits and importance of creating liveable streets for community connection and children's outdoor play. The case studies give us a solid foundation to build on to achieve a target of 80 PlayStreets in South Australia by 2025.

The next step is to build the network - interested councils are encouraged to join. Together we can do more to support community connection and children's play through 1000PlayStreets.


