

KEY ISSUES IN DEVELOPING AN AUDIT OR INVENTRY OF PLAYGROUNDS

Some issues which should always be included in any brief for the development of an inventory or audit of playgrounds areas.

The Brief needs to require the following:

- a record of the location, type and range of equipment;
- an inspection of the equipment and areas for compliance with Australian Standards;

(Particular attention needs to be paid to the following issues; height of equipment, ground surfacing, fall heights and fall zones, installation of equipment, and entrapment)

- an evaluation of the surroundings;
- an indication of the potential for removal, relocation or installation of additional equipment, and
- the provision of a summary of the overall quality, range and play value of playgrounds across the municipality.

Most people who provide audits of playgrounds focus solely on the individual pieces of play equipment from a safety perspective. Whilst assessment for risk is very important it is strongly recommended that these further issues be given serious attention.

Some principals and guidelines which need to be considered in any development of an inventory of municipal playgrounds.
