


A desire to connect



So enjoy the day with outdoor play!

Stakeholder's action sheet

Every 12 months, OPAL introduces a new healthy lifestyle message to our community. The current message is 'Life looks brighter outside. Enjoy the day with outdoor play at your local park or playground'. This aim is to support families to enjoy time together through exploring local parks and playgrounds.

What you should know

- South Australian children are now spending less time outdoors than at any other time in our history. US data suggests a 50% decrease in free play time since the 1970's (Play Matters, 2008).
- Kids 8-12 years spend nearly half their free time plugged into technology but prefer outdoor play over technology and want to spend more time playing with their parents (Australian State of Play report, 2012).
- Whilst the increased amount of children's screen time is one reason for the decrease in outdoor activity, other factors play a role such as: an increasingly scheduled after school life, smaller back yards, increased risk aversion to things such as climbing trees, and concerns about child safety and children independently going to parks (ABS 2012).
- Getting active outdoors has real benefits to children in terms of their physical and mental health.

- Local councils have a wide range of parks, playgrounds and walking trails.
- OPAL supports the community to be active in local parks and playgrounds and will make this a prime focus through the 'Life looks brighter outside' theme in 2014.
- To do this, OPAL wants to support parents to recognise the fun they can have with their children outside and for children to explore and live an adventure.

Activity habits of our kids

- Kids need at least 60 minutes of moderate to vigorous physical activity each day (Australian Government National Physical Activity Guidelines).
- 63% of South Australian children do not meet the guidelines for sufficient physical activity. But kids are not alone, with 55% of South Australian adults also not meeting the guidelines for adults of at least 30 minutes per day of physical activity (SAMSS).
- In Australia 87% of children spend more time playing indoors than outdoors (Planet Ark 2011).
- South Australian children spend an average of 4.5 hours a day in front of a screen, exceeding the national average by half an hour (CSIRO 2007). Yet our children spend less than two hours a day outside (Planet Ark 2013).
- The average Australian child spends less time outdoors than a maximum security prisoner (Griffin Longley, CEO, Nature Play WA).

- > Time outdoors all time low.
- > ½ Kids free time on screens
- Scheduled after school life, smaller back yards, risk aversion & concerns unsupervised park and school travel.



REMOVING THE BUBBLE WRAP: Why children's outdoor play matters and how you can take a balanced approach

FREE OPAL Campbelltown parents forum with international expert Tim Gill

When parents had their say to help inform OPAL, common themes were that they love the parks, creeks and trails in Campbelltown. What stops parents from using them more is being time poor and not letting children enjoy them on their own because of fear of strangers and traffic danger.

British outdoor play and childhood expert Tim Gill will lead a Q&A session on how we can best use our great outdoor assets as part of an overall approach that hallenges communities to allow children more freedon in their everyday lives. Tim Gill is the author of No Fear: Growing up in a risk averse society, and is in demand around the world as a public speaker. This street play event is a significant milestone because it will be the first to be resident rather than council/OPAL led. In response to a positive local messenger story, a local resident has been inspired to be 'street play coordinator' for her street in November 2016. OPAL will use this opportunity to transition from an OPAL generated initiative to a resident led, council supported initiative. The vision is to develop an 'easy' council system that makes it appealing for residents to volunteer their street. The key is finding a balance between complying with road and risk management regulations and customer focus.

Rationale

It is assumed that if children are spending leisure time outdoors, they are more likely to be sufficiently active than if they are spending leisure time indoors. Outdoor street play was a social norm twenty years ago but is no longer the case. It is hoped that a short-term positive program experience will influence the parent community to improve access to outdoor play for children and improve government's policy response if community demand increases.





Key elements: 4 Simple Steps

- 1. Get permission and support
- 2. Talk to your neighbours and set a date
- 3. Tell everyone
- 4. Enjoy the day!



Sunday Street Play in 4 Simple Steps

1. Get permission and support

The first step is to apply to the council for permission to close the road. The Campbelltown City Council will only approve local roads and Street Play events on Sundays to ensure the safety of local residents.

2. Talk to your neighbours and set a date

How you do this is up to you. We advise talking in the street, door-knocking; leafleting and holding an informal meeting (you could use our template meeting invitation). The Important thing is to make sure everyone feets included and consulted from the beginning. It is also important to make sure you have enough people willing to make the day a success. Recrutting people is also a good chance to get to know your neighbours better.

3. Tell everyone

This just means publicising the times day of your event to everyone on the street and inviting them to come outside. Use our template posters and flyers or make your own. Try to make everyone feel included and ensure it is clear that parents are responsible for their own children.

4. Enjoy the day!

On the day, do as long as the road is closed and stewarded safely you can more or less let everything else take care of Itself – children and families will make their own fun in a welcoming environment. Enjoy it.
